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SAI Update

Liz Efroymson-Brooks: We have gotten the word from the Suzuki Association of America that our application has been accepted. Emilie Grondin, host of the Annual Meeting: The Annual Meeting will be held on July 13, at Stanley Clark School in South Bend, on July 13, 9:00am-4:00pm. (SCS is at 3123 S. Miami St, South Bend, 46614). When I talked with Jillian when we got together a few weeks ago, I bounced off her my idea of a theme that is near and dear to me: chamber music. Our area is rich is chamber music with the Fischoff National Chamber Music Association and also the Michigan City Chamber Music Festival. We just had the Fischoff competition May 10-12 (go to Fischoff.org to find out more) and this past Saturday, May 18, was the MCCMF competition. So I was looking for the person that would be the best to speak to a bunch of Suzuki teachers about incorporating chamber music in the studio. I decided to go with Nic Orbovich, the founder and director of the MCCMF. (I had to hold off asking him until the results were announced for the competition in order to avoid any semblance of impropriety as both my husband and I had groups entered. [My piano trio won the junior division!]) Nic agreed and is very excited to speak.

In lieu of a "play-in" (which tends to be a violin-centered event and we also have cello, flute and piano teachers to include) I would like to do a chamber music reading session. This would involve reading the String Quartets of Violin Books 1, 2, 3, the String Accompaniments to the Flute books and some of the other ensemble literature written/arranged by Suzuki teachers. We can ask teachers to bring their sets of the ensembles (clearly labeled) to avoid making copies. If we decide to invite students, they could play the melody, which is like doing a play-in. I will assemble a specific list of music to bring which can be sent out in the June newsletter.

In addition, as part of the presentation, I will have some student groups perform. I run a chamber music camp at SCS in the summer, this year scheduled July 8-12. This might be helpful for some teachers to see what can be done at a younger age.

The Gaska String Quartet made up of Suzuki teachers Dolores Wilson, Joyce Davis, Martha Bradberry and me will also be in attendance and will be willing to help as needed. Joyce will be providing music from the Suzuki Music School of Granger for use in the reading session.

Indiana's Suzuki Institute Celebrates 4 Years!

The Indy Arts & Music (IAM) Festival still has openings for students and teacher trainees at its fourth annual Suzuki Institute in Indianapolis (July 22-26). Students of all disciplines and ability levels are invited to attend, and the IAM Festival is particularly looking to fill a few select cello and piano openings!

The IAM Festival was co-founded in 2010 by Indianapolis native and Suzuki piano teacher Ann Sloan and her administrative collaborator, Scott Kolman-Keen. It is the only Suzuki Institute in Indiana, and one of the most affordable institutes in the nation! The IAM Festival offers all students a daily semi-private lesson, plus a wide range of elective choices including group lessons, music theory, orchestra (early-reading and advanced), music composition, fiddling, jazz, handbells, guitar, gymnastics, martial arts, and visual arts. Faculty includes notable Suzuki teachers, collegiate professors, and studio musicians from all over the state and country. Suzuki Teacher Training is also being offered for Unit 1 Violin and Piano and Unit 2 Piano, as well as the informative Every Child Can! course for teacher trainees and Suzuki families.

New this year - Andover Educator Bridget Jankowski from Ohio offers a special course aimed especially at teachers. "What Every Musician Needs to Know About the Body" is a 6 hour course designed to set each participant on a path of self-evaluation and change, in order that he or she may eventually arrive at a sensory-motor integrity sufficient to becoming and remaining free of injury and pain through a lifetime of performing with increasing pleasure and proficiency. The six-hour course will be offered on Sunday, July 21, and is only \$100.

Founder Ann Sloan: "This year, the IAM Festival truly expands its global reach by hosting Ernesto Zegarra and 38 of his young musicians from Peru. You won't want to miss this unique experience. We'd love to provide a complete, enriching experience to this traveling group by sharing the talents of a full complement of violin, viola, cello, and piano students!"

The IAM Festival is situated in the modern Arts Center facility on the campus of Hasten Hebrew Academy in Indianapolis. Families attend an informational meeting on Sunday evening, July 21, followed by a week of classes July 22-26. Flexible scheduling for families; childcare is also available. The Festival concludes with a traditional Suzuki play-in at the Indy Artsgarden on Saturday, July 27.
